Institutional Repositories Usage Statistics in UK (IRUS-UK)

IRUS-UK collects raw usage data from UK Institutional Repositories (IRs) and processes these data into COUNTER-compliant statistics. This provides repositories with comparable, authoritative, standards-based data and opportunities for profiling at a national level. IRUS-UK is a community-driven development, responding to user needs.

COAR and IRUS-UK

COAR (Confederation of Open Access Repositories) has just launched a draft 'Resource Type' Vocabulary for Open Access Repositories as part of the COAR Interest Group's work on developing a series of controlled vocabularies for OA repositories. News item: <http://bit.ly/1TOEFiz>

The draft version is available for comment by the broader community and COAR invites you to provide feedback on the definition and the vocabulary terms. All comments can be posted on the COAR website for consideration. The period for input will be two months from August 1 to October 1, 2015. How IRUS-UK can be used

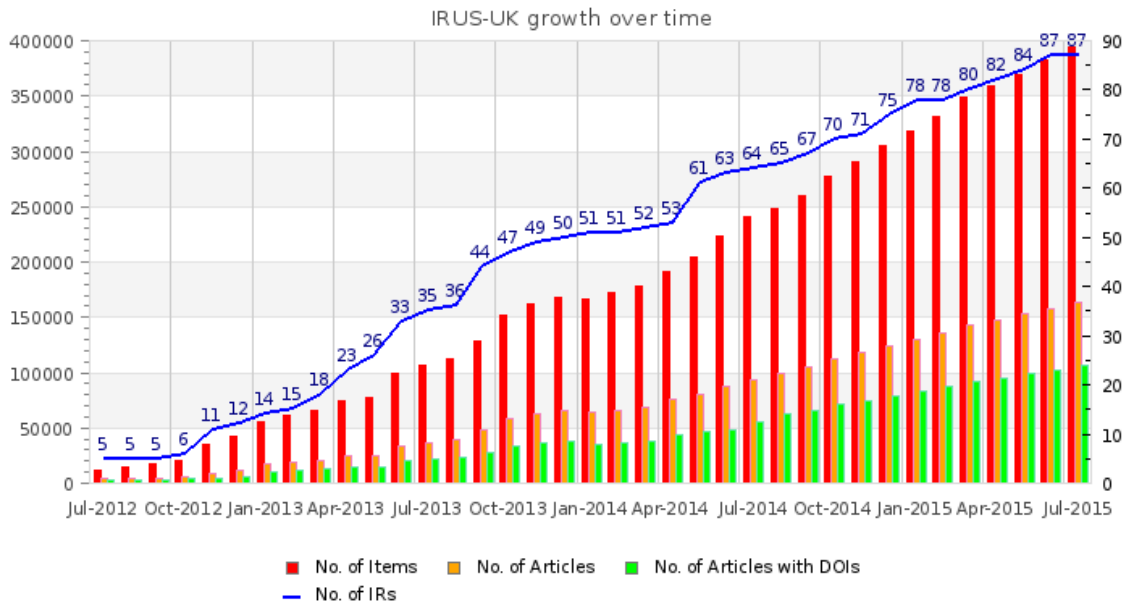
'IRUS-UK in Practice' webinar in May

Users from three of our institutional repositories illustrated some of the ways they use IRUS-UK. These covered using repository download reports from IRUS-UK to demonstrate usage statistics to management and the institution's committee on research excellence; broadcasting via an OA repository newsletter to raise awareness and highlight most downloaded articles and theses etc. within their institution; and by showing repository rankings, benchmarking of content policies and by aiding in data cleansing via our DOI Duplicates Report 1 (DD1).

We are very grateful to Alison Sutton, University of Reading; Amy Staniforth, Aberystwyth University; and Chris Biggs, Open University for sharing their experiences and showing a variety of ways in which IRUS-UK data is regularly being used.

Project Honey Pot is a free, distributed, web-based, open source system for identifying the IP addresses of spammers and spambots. IRUS-UK is participating in Project Honey Pot and has contributed to the project by identifying a previously unknown email harvester. We recommend that our users also participate.
